The Chapter Quizzes are based on the textbook readings and can be taken once these are completed. The Video Lectures cover many of the same concepts as the text and go into more detail on areas covered in the respective discussions and essays and should be completed before attempting. The Political Theory Essay and Amendments Quiz both require study and review of the US Constitution. The exam evaluates knowledge of the material covered until that point (Modules 1-3). The Final Project requires a review of the entire political system as covered throughout the course including highlighted external resources and government websites.
