Explain current research methods, the ethical considerations in conducting research, and effective use of the American Psychological Association (APA) style in presenting information.

Identify the major theoretical orientations in psychology and demonstrate knowledge of basic psychological concept regarding behavior and mental processes.

Practice psychological principles examined to the development of interpersonal, occupational and social skills, and life-long personal growth.

Recognize and describe the complexity of social, cultural, and international diversity.

Utilize critical thinking skills to analyze, evaluate, and make decisions concerning complex contemporary issues in psychology.

Course Objectives

Objectives are defined as what the course will do and/or what the students will do as part of the course.

This course provides an introduction to the science of Psychology including its major areas, terms and contributions.

Students will develop an understanding of scientific methods and research in the discipline.

A critical attitude toward behavior and an understanding of the importance of the influence of individual differences in behavior will be taught.

Students will discriminate facts from misconceptions about the field of Psychology via critical thinking skills.
