Course Student Learning Outcomes:

The following outcomes will be assessed in this course. An "outcome" is defined as something students take with them beyond this course. After successful completion of this course, the student will...

- Develop a chronological analysis and evaluation and study of western art beginning with the Pre-Historic, Ancient, Medieval, and ending with the coverage of early Renaissance Art. Also considered will be social, religious, geographical, and historical influences which affected the development of western art.
- Define specialized concepts and terms that are important for a valid interpretation of Western Art and apply the concepts and terms to the art studied and viewed.
- Name major artistic periods and movements along with approximate dates and general characteristics of Western Art.

Course Objectives:

Objectives are defined as what the course will do and/or what the students will do as part of the course.

- Analyze and evaluate Western Art in chronological order from Pre-History to Early Renaissance i.e., prehistoric, ancient, medieval, and early Renaissance.
- Analyze social, religious, geographical, and historical influences on the development of Western Art.
- Recognize and identify major artists and works as related to periods and styles of art.
- Describe the basic tools and principles of art.
